Israel's First Dragon Boat Festival Paddles into History

On May 17 and 18, 2012 more than nine hundred participants paddled into history at Israel's first ever dragon boat festival. Dragon Boat Israel (DBI) was a joint Canada-Israel initiative to introduce our sport to Israel, originating with members of an Ottawa, Canada team who wanted to combine their love of dragon boat racing with their

love of this small, dynamic, courageous and historic country.

It was both exciting and challenging to be involved in this unique and historic event. As new paddlers, most Israeli teams were unfamiliar with 'standard festival procedures' – waivers, rosters, etc., explaining protocols to many who did not speak English was a challenge in tact and diplomacy.

There were thirty-nine teams, twenty Israeli and nineteen international teams, with paddlers from the United States, Canada, Holland, Australia and Taiwan.

Eight breast cancer teams participated, five from Canada, one from the United States and two from Israel. They were Abreast Spitfires, Canadians Abreast Heart, Canadians Abreast Spirit, International Pink Sisters - Winner, G Division Final, Island Breaststrokers, Israel Cancer Association, Two Abreast / Cote-a-Cote - Breast Cancer Survivor Challenge Winner and Yad Lahachlama Israel Cancer Association

Queen's Diamond Jubilee Pageant: A Weekend to Remember

"Hip hip hoorah, hip hip hoorah" signalled a momentous moment for Team Internationally Abreast on the River Thames in London on Sunday, June 3, 2012. We were part of the one thousand boat flotilla celebrating Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee Pageant, and represented the **International Breast** Cancer Paddlers' Commission, a movement that began with one team in Vancouver, Canada, in

1996. Our team, drawn from seven countries - Canada, United States, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Italy and Ireland, represented over one hundred and fifty breast cancer teams world-wide. To top it all, Dr. Don McKenzie, the founder of breast cancer dragon boat paddling, steered our boat.

When we arrived, London was buzzing with excitement and anticipation. On May 31, the team and its supporters were delighted to meet each other face to face for the very first time. The next day we held our one and only practice at the London Rowing Club in London's East End. This enabled us to seat our fourteen allowed paddlers to the best advantage to cover the thirteen mile course at four knots (4.6 mph) per hour. It was exhibitating to be on the water together!

Then on June 2 we were off to a Strawberry Tea at Canada House in Trafalgar Square marking the recognition by the British national charity, Breast Cancer Care, of the British teams, including Paddlers for Life led by Sue Cogley and Louisa Balderson. Dr. McKenzie's keynote speech to English medical personnel and participating breast cancer teams emphasized the latest findings on the significance of exercise.

Finally June 3 and the Pageant! At Putney, under the watchful eyes of our cox, IBCPC President Jane Frost and our helms, Dr. McKenzie we delightedly paddled our boat named, Lucy at Low Wood, so kindly loaned to us by Paddlers for Life, joined the almost three hundred manpowered boats at the front of the flotilla, and passed under the first of nineteen bridges. We relished every moment.

Thousands and thousands of cheering people lined the river's banks and bridges as hundreds of boats, like the scene in a Canaletto painting, progressed steadily past the historic buildings of London and the royal barge where Her Majesty took the royal salute. Eventually we reached Tower Bridge and the superb Avenue of Sail. By this time we were literally flying with a huge sense of achievement so that the rain and the wind did nothing to dampen our spirits on the final five miles to Greenwich. By this time we were frozen but quickly revived to the cheers of our supporters, gallons of hot tea and dry clothes. The six hours we had been on the river felt like six minutes and we had loved the experience.

We are grateful for the support of the Canadian High Commission and Air Canada, and for the publicity by Australian television and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. We achieved what we had set out to do – honour the Queen through our participation, raise awareness about breast cancer and show that those who had been diagnosed with and treated for breast cancer can lead full and active lives.

their abilities.

Thank you IBCPC for inviting me to be part of your team for the Thames Diamond Jubilee Pageant. Since I have been closely associated with the Vancouver breast cancer paddlers I have a continuing interest in their networking with other paddlers around the world. The highlight of 2012 will be the paddle down the Thames in the Queen's Jubilee Celebration; one of life's most memorable events.

Once that event was over I moved onto the London Olympic Games which will be my eighth summer Olympics in one capacity or another. It has been a privilege to be the doctor, physiologist and part-time coach for the Canadian Canoe Team for the last thirty years. It is both an honour and a challenge to help them perform to the best of

The International Canoe Federation (ICF) is the governing body for Canoeing and I've been the Chair of the Medical Committee for the ICF for about fifteen years. As a sports medicine doctor with interest in asthmatic athletes I have also been part of an International Olympic Committee Medical Committee that monitors these competitors. Unfortunately, there is a dark side to sport and one of my responsibilities as Medical Officer for Canoeing at the Games, and elsewhere, is to oversee doping control programs to prevent athletes from using prohibited substances to artificially improve performance.

A week before the Games began we traveled to Europe to deal with the five to eight hour time-zone change from Canada to London. Historically, we go to Temple-sur-lot, in southern France. It is quiet, has excellent facilities, great weather and a perfect place to adjust and begin the taper leading to competition. The flatwater canoe/kayak racing is the second week of the Games and takes place on the same venue as the rowers, who compete in the first week. The course is west of London (Eton College) and there is an Olympic Village at Royal Holloway College, part of the University of London, with a magnificent Founders Building that looks like something from a Harry Potter movie.

Although the Games opened July 27 the sprint racing finals did not open until August 8. Getting the right mix of training and rest is a critical issue for these athletes and has a huge impact on performance. It is not an exact science and is the job of the coaches and support team. Athletes train for four years for this one event so there is a mixture of anxiety, apprehension and expectation to deal with. Being immersed in this environment is actually something I enjoy and aside from any health or injury issues, I try to offer my experience and advice in this last phase of preparation. Getting to the A Final is a significant achievement and a place on the podium the ultimate goal.

2012 International Dragon Boat Club Crew World Championships (CCWC) Victoria Harbour, Hong Kong

The CCWC in Hong Kong July 4-8, 2012 was exciting and challenging. There were four thousand seven hundred participants from twenty-three countries and tens of thousands spectators. The choice of Hong Kong was a nod to the birthplace of modern day dragon boating festival. Twenty-five years ago, Hong Kong was the site of the first modern day dragon boat festival.

In terms of tradition, Hong Kong was tops. As far as world-class dragon boat racing, the venue was challenging. Victoria is the busiest harbor in the world and has a constant flow of cargo ships, oil tankers, and cruise ships. Fourteen huge barges were brought in to provide a breakwater. It provided some help, but the South China Sea was rough (an understatement). Waves, currents, and tides were a constant challenge. There was plenty on the positive side—particularly the jaw-dropping, phenomenal paddling! Hong Kong is a great contradiction of old and new; traditional and commercial; mountains and skyscrapers. It was a sensory bonanza of sights, colors, sound, tastes, and smells.

For my Dragonheart team the experience was a mix of high highs and low lows. We began with a practice session that was unexpected. We got in the boat with our eighteen paddlers and no bailers. We took two strokes and the waves came over the bow of the boat nearly swamping us. We got the boat back to the dock, regrouped, put a few more paddlers in the boat, devised a bailing plan and continued with the practice. Paddling in the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Pageant on the River Thames was a cake walk compared to the waters of Hong Kong's Victoria Harbour.

In the CCWC there were three breast cancer teams, two from the United States, Wisconsin's Pink Paddling Power and Dragonheart, Vermont and one from Australia, Brisbane's River Dragons. In our two hundred meter races we raced with two adaptive paddler teams—one deaf and one with amazing adaptive paddlers. Both of these teams were supplemented by 'supporters'—as permitted by the event rules for these crews. There were no all-cancer boats in the races.

The most memorable moment of the week for me was watching the paddlers who were amputees being lifted out of the rocky boats to an equally rocky dock and ultimately to their wheel chairs. They were just beaming! Our teams were there to give them the cheers and the standing ovation they deserved. Really, every paddler should have seen this sight. It would re-define what an athlete is! And, it reinforces our message that after a diagnosis and treatment for breast cancer you can lead a full active life and paddle with the best.

Teams PDL and SOS are planning a variety of events that will introduce paddlers to this beautiful and balmy coastal community and encourage them to meet and interact with other crews from around the world. As the event approaches, PDL and SOS members will reach out to provide local information and serve as liaisons to each team.

This vacation spot has plenty of **hotel rooms and the Festival housing bureau** is negotiating the very best rates at three levels of hotels. The estimated price range (in US\$) is currently: economy (\$80.00); full service (\$140.00), or luxury beach resort (\$200). Subject to change, the final rates will be determined by volume, and all teams are strongly urged to make reservations through the bureau so the committee can meet their targets, ensure the lowest prices, and provide other helpful support services to our guests. **Free transportation to and from festival events will be limited to these hotels**. Final details and the registration portal and housing portal will be available through the Festival's website as soon as possible, approximately October 2012.

The Festival Website should be developed and ready to launch in Fall/Winter 2012. It will provide a wide range of information on the event, activities, the local community, housing and travel options, etc. The festival committee will notify teams as soon as the website is available thru the IBCPC newsletter and Website. A social media campaign will also be developed, so you can follow the plans.


