"The whole experience can only be described as magical"

Istanbul, a huge city more that 1500 years old with approximately twenty million people, straddles two continents separated by the Bosphorus. It was there on a glorious summer evening that I had the delight of joining Pembe Lotus, or Pink Lotus, Turkey's first breast cancer dragon boat team, at its practice. This is a new team - it's been paddling since April of this year and in September joined 110 teams in its second dragon boat Festival, the Kurumlararasi Dragon Festivali, for which it was preparing. As we met and despite my not understanding a word of Turkish it was easy to capture the absolute joy and enthusiasm of the team. With the happy chatter of the paddlers and the coach's commands in Turkish we glided out onto the waters of the Golden Horn against the famous backdrop of the Blue Mosque, Haghia Sophia and the Topkapi Palace. As the sun set into a magnificent red and the calls to prayer resonated around the Golden Horn the whole experience can only be described as magical.

The inspiration and driving force behind Pembe Lotus is its non-paddling captain Cengiz Unutmaz. He is dedicated to the concept of good health through proper diet and exercise for everyone and particularly for those recovering from cancers of all types. His primary focus is breast cancer survivors. He was supported by Dr Don McKenzie, the Canadian doctor who established, in 1996, the first breast cancer dragon boat team. Cengiz also consulted the American College of Sports

Medicine about dragon boat paddling. His use of the College's fitness programme has won him the support of the medical profession in Istanbul. In addition to his work with Pembe Lotus he has been invited to speak on a medical panel to an eastern European audience about the significance of dragon boat paddling for breast cancer survivors.

To meet the training needs of his paddlers who live in different parts of Istanbul, in fact on different continents, Cengiz has arranged two training centres—one in an oncology clinic on the European side and the other in a private club across the Bosphorus on the Asian side. At the club, under the watchful eye of their trainer, I saw some of the Pembe Lotus team members hard at work on one aspect of their training—their individually computer programmed krankcycle. This stationary bike, "peddled" with one's arms and designed to build upper body, cardio and core strength, is programmed to individual fitness and needs. The bike and the ladies' performance was most impressive. Regular attendance at the training sessions is a requirement of paddling and is approved by the paddlers' doctors.

Cengiz's commitment and vision knows no bounds and the delight and enthusiasm of the team both on and off the water speaks for itself. Both Cengiz and Pembe Lotus are hopeful that some of its paddlers will be able to attend the 2014 IBCPC Participatory Festival in Sarasota.

Getting your Questions Answered

Dr Don McKenzie, founder and coach of the first breast cancer dragon boat team, Abreast In A Boat, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada (1996) does a regular column in this newsletter. Please submit your questions by visiting our website: www.ibcpc.com and click on the newsletter icon.



Question: What progress has been made in the study of upper extremity lymphedema in women who have been treated for breast cancer?

Answer: We have come a long way. In the spring of 1996, the original 24 women from Abreast in A Boat volunteered to paddle a dragon boat to demonstrate that repetitive, strenuous, upper body exercise would not cause lymphedema, a potential side-effect of breast cancer treatment that most patients fear. Traditional medi-

cine always errors on the side of conservative treatment; these decisions are often not based on empirical evidence but rather on what seemed to work in the past and was accepted as standard of care. In that era, to exercise during or after treatment was a foreign concept and not recommended- forbidden to women who simply wished to return to a full and active life.

The success of the dragon boat program begged the question 'why didn't these women develop lymphedema? 'This initiated a new round of research that investigated lymphatic function and exercise. Our lab at the University of British Columbia, and several others, have been active in this initiative and the literature in this area has grown exponentially. Solid science has given us a better look at how physical activity influences the breast cancer patient and the woman with lymphedema. It is clear that exercise, when performed in a progressive fashion, does not cause lymphedema. Exercises to restore range of motion and strength to the chest wall, shoulder and upper extremity are beneficial and regular physical activity has effects that extend well beyond cancer. Publications in the top medical journals are beginning to change the way clinicians think about lymphedema. Recently, there was a report in the New England Journal of Medicine on the benefits and safety of resistance exercise in patients with lymphedema. We have come a very long way from False Creek in Vancouver, where the first group of courageous women were prepared to challenge the myth that exercise would result in lymphedema.

In 2013 the thinking regarding physical activity and breast cancer has changed. Exercise programs for women, during chemotherapy, are common and the benefits to the physical and mental health have been repeatedly documented. Lymphedema still occurs and there are important guidelines to follow, but it is not feared the way it was 20 years ago. Those 24 women-among them, Jane Frost, President of IBCPC have opened the door to a new era of health and wellness.

Suzanne founded Chestmates Dragon Boat team in 2002 in Kingston Ontario, Canada when her unbridled enthusiasm to start a team garnered the support of the local breast cancer organization, Breast Cancer Action Kingston (BCAK). Not only did she serve as team captain for the first four years, but she also initiated and organized other programs for BCAK—an annual retreat, an exercise class, and a yoga class for those diagnosed with breast cancer.

Suzanne paddled her heart out with both Chestmates and Canadians Abreast, loving every moment of feeling the power of friendship and the heart-pounding joy of physical activity. However, while travelling in South Africa on an adventure tour after the international Capetown dragon boat festival, Suzanne broke her back in an accident which ended her paddling days. However, the accident also gave her the opportunity to be filled with gratitude for the local and worldwide support she received from her sister dragon boaters after her surgery in South Africa and during her recovery at home in Kingston. Now, she channels her energies into acting as "the history book" and mentor for Chestmates' newbies. Suzanne is also very proud of her work in leading a team of musicians and artists to produce and launch the fundraising CD "Take it Away", the survivor dragon boat song whose lyrics were written by a Chestmates teammate and which is now played at Flower Ceremonies all around the world.

Contributing to the IBCPC newsletter as a writer, editor and translator has been a joy for Suzanne. She is also enthusiastic about and honoured to take on her new role as National Representative for Eastern Ontario. These contributions are her way of saying "thanks" and for staying connected to those who ride the dragon.

She is responsible for the Ontario teams in Ottawa, Bethany, Kingston, Lindsay, Pickering, Amprior, Barrie and Peterborough.

Moving to a different part of the world

Sandee Thompson is a transplanted dragon boater from the Bosom Buddies, Nova Scotia, Canada. She is currently working at the College of the North Atlantic in Doha, the capital of the State of Qatar.

Living life as a breast cancer survivor can be disconcerting. In order to cope with this new event, we restructure our lives in some way in order to accommodate and beat this demon. My way is to have a good cry and then get deeply involved in whatever is going on.

In Doha, Qatar, despite groups being advertised, you really have to search to find groups related to cancer and people willing to talk about it. I have joined the recently created

Doha Dragons, a brand new dragon boat society, and am hoping to form a survivor team once I find some more survivors! I have also agreed to be the 'face' of a breast cancer survivor at my college. We did a week of breast cancer awareness activities including a mini-flashmob, bake sale, speakers and walks around campus.

In Qatar, Dr. Mahasen, at the Qatar Cancer Society, spends her time doing community outreach in schools and businesses. There is a women's hospital that provides workshops on breast self- examinations and clinical exams and mammograms are done at numerous hospitals in the city. You can just walk in and have one done that day! The Qatar Cancer Society, Hyatt Group and Think Pink Qatar all provide volunteer services to survivors including fundraising events, speakers, discussion groups and hospital support for appointments and treatment.

20% of all cancers in Qatar are breast cancer and many of those diagnosed have been in the later stages because breast cancer is not openly talked about in Qatar, where modesty and privacy are highly valued. However, there were pink ribbons all over the city this past month and the country's awareness campaign is having an effect on numbers of women being diagnosed earlier. This is huge progress and it can only get better now that the country is on a roll.

The Journey of a Thousand Miles, in the Footsteps of John Muir

"I only went out for a walk and finally concluded to stay out till sundown, for going out, I found, was really going in." — John Muir

With somewhat more than the fabled 'twist of tea and hunk of bread', I will follow in the footsteps of Scottishborn American naturalist John Muir who, in 1867, walked from Indiana to the Gulf of Mexico on a 'floral pilgrimage'. At Cedar Keys, where he sailed on to Cuba, I will continue on to Sarasota, Florida to take part in the International Breast Cancer Paddlers' Commission Participatory Dragon Boat Festival - 'A Celebration of Life'.

I shall start my journey in July 2014 by sailing on a cargo ship from Southampton, England, to New York City and then by bus to Jeffersonville, Indiana where I will begin to follow Muir's route. He was the American conservationist who was a major influence in the formation of the National Parks system including both Yellowstone and Yosemite Parks, and the Sierra Club. My walk will mark the centenary of his death.

Money raised along the way will be shared between the John Muir Trust (the Scottish equivalent of the Sierra Club) and Paddlers for Life United Kingdom, a national network of breast cancer dragon boat teams. Under the Paddlers' umbrella I helped establish Edinburgh's Port Edgar Dragons in 2011.

This will be my first trip to the United States and I shall be photographing, blogging and tweeting every step of the way. As a visual artist focusing on nature, ecology and environment, this documentation will form the basis of a series of art exhibitions beginning in 2015. (www.emmaherman-smith.com)

There is no set trail and most of the walking will be on tarmac, passing through Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Georgia and Florida. This is unlike anything I have done before and I am in full training to ensure the daily 15-25 miles are enjoyable. With the help of local radio, people will be encouraged to walk with me 'an hour or a mile' and I will be strongly reliant on individual kindness and hospitality to help me on my way.
