She fell in love with the sport the first time she paddled. Dragon boating allows team members to live in a new way she discovered. She now enjoys drumming and tries to encourage and stimulate her teammates. Since she has been involved in the annual Florence Pink Meeting she has helped promote the event to the BCS teams throughout the world such is her enthusiasm and commitment.

Lucia attended her first IBCPC Festival in 2014 at Sarasota, Florida, USA and was so excited by it she decided to lead, as president, the oganizing of the next IBCPC Festival 2018 in Florence, Italy.

Since it has been announced she has started making plans for the outstanding event by establishing the **FIRENZE IN ROSA** committee which also has the important objective of promoting a healthy lifestyle,



disseminating a culture of prevention and giving a message of hope thanks to the direct testimony of those who have overcome the difficult experience of breast cancer.

Logo contest attracts young artists. The first important step for FIRENZE IN ROSA was to create the 2018 logo by holding a competition for young graphic designers. The goal was to reach primarily young people who are uninformed about breast cancer.

The contest was a great success with 38 participants from all over the world producing a very high level of design quality. In the end a single winner was chosen. The award went to a young designer from Turin, Italy: Erik Caresio. The press conference included institutional representatives from the Municipality of Florence, the Tuscany Region and CONI (Italian National Olympic **Committee),** along with reporters and many friends and supporters. 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### Argentina forms teams with help of friends

Argentina now has four established dragon boat teams - the first in Latin and South America. These teams were encouraged with help from Adriana Bartoli and the team of Abreast In A Boat (AIAB) of Vancouver, Canada. As far back as three years ago, she promised Lia Del


As a new activity in the country there are no coaches or experienced paddlers and steers available to train new teams. Instruction was critical.

When the boats arrived in December of 2015 six members of AIAB and Kim Bonomo. representing International Breast Cancer Paddlers' Commission from Miami, Florida, USA made up the training team.

Said Adriana of the experience, "Until we met with these novices I never understood, how through the camaraderie of paddling, hope replaces loneliness and fear and can change lives forever. When we spoke with the women about how dragon boating links them to a worldwide sisterhood of breast cancer survivors, many were moved to tears."

Breast cancer is still a somewhat taboo topic in many areas of South America. The Argentina team members are pioneers in their country. They were grateful Abreast In A Boat members **Kim Bonomo** would come to their country to help them become part of the sisterhood. Many said, "Just as you have come here to help us, we will now go to other parts of Argentina to help form teams for other survivors."



The year 2015 marked the 20th Anniversary of breast cancer dragon boat paddling. Teams from around the world paddled in their home locales on June 13, 2015 and celebrated those first years. Teams were asked to then submit a short history of their team and its activities. These documents have been compiled into a 20 Years Souvenir Memento entitled: Our Stories. One hundred teams

from twelve countries on six continents submitted their stories and a moving tribute to the power of dragon boating for breast cancer survivors is now available.

# Spanish Festival attracts teams from five countries

As is the tradition at breast cancer event regattas, the paddlers' participation concluded with a moving Flower Ceremony, the first in Spain.

Easter 2016 saw seven breast cancer teams participate in San Pedro del Pinatar (Saint Peter of the Pinewoods) 4th international dragon boat festival in South-east Spain. The festival is jointly run by the local A.D. Pinatarense club and the San Pedro del Pinatar Council. It was led by Jorge Carracedo and his team. This year was particularly special for breast cancer racing in Spain as it coincided with the establishment of Spain's first breast cancer (BCS) team, based in Pinatar: Flamenco Rosa.

The festival organizers made the BCS teams feel very welcome and organised a special BCS forum to enable the teams to meet each other. A member of each team was invited to deliver a short presentation on various aspects of their BCS journey and activities.

The racing was a highlight of the event. The BCS teams made this event one of the largest contingent of breast cancer teams in a European venue. There were seven teams from five countries: Canada, France, Italy, Spain, and the United Kingdom. The teams paddled in ten and twenty person boats.

The competition also had a stunning setting on the Mar Menor ("Little Sea"), a coastal saltwater lagoon which is the largest in Europe – although increasingly rough water conditions throughout the day added to the challenge and tested the nerves of the crews!

Margaret Hobson, one of five Abreast In A Boat members from Vancouver, Canada was a paddler on the Canadians Abreast team says: "We were dazzled by the exuberance of the Spanish people and the young people were so lively and excited it wore off on us. Meeting breast cancer paddlers from other countries enhanced the event even more."



**Lucia De Ranieri,** President of 2018 IBCPC Florence Participatory Dragon Boat Festival comments: "The Pinatar Festival was a confirmation that pink strength and energy is contagious! The presence of BCS at this festival has once again demonstrated the extent to which our positive message can, on one hand, instil courage and hope and, on the other, raise consciousness."

**Cecilia Picchi,** IBCPC European representative, had this to say: "The Pinatar festival was the culmination of months of hard work and coordination in English and Spanish. It was all worth it. *Flamenco Rosa's* facebook page is filled with many enthusiastic "muchas gracias" for the encouragement and inspiration given to them by their new friends from Europe and Canada."

Linda Smith, Secretary for Pool of Life, Liverpool, England says "A big "hello" to all the lovely BCS ladies we met at the festival and we look forward to seeing you all again in Florence in 2018 or maybe sooner."





The breast cancer paddling movement began in the United Kingdom in 2005. **Eve Elliott Pearson** from Liverpool initiated the team *Pool of Life* and now there are seven teams in different parts of Great Britain: Liverpool, Windermere, Worcester, Wigan, Port Edgar, Manchester and Dorset.

### Liverpool team a winner

*Pool of Life,* the first dragon boat team for breast cancer survivors to be established in the United Kingdom was founded in 2004 with support from the local dragon boat team *Amathus* and a grant which enabled the team to purchase its own boat. Based in Liverpool, in the North-West of England, the team trains all year round on salt-water in an area of redeveloped docklands, at the Liverpool Watersports Centre.

A registered charity, the team has a structured training program for its members and offers a range of paddling activities including gentle, social paddles, fun charity events and serious racing at UK and international venues. Some of the members also race with *Amathus* and others have represented GB at the international level. The team's aim is to attend at least one international event each year. And they have done so: recently raced in Dublin (2015) and in San Pedro del Pintar (Saint Peter in the Pinewoods) in South-East Spain to take part in the town's fourth international dragon boat festival. It was while competing there *Pool of Life* won the overall Breast Cancer Survivors' trophy with accompanying medals. www.pooloflife.net

**Sue Cogley** and **Louisa Balderson** are the two founding members of *Paddlers for Life, Windermere* and they work hard encouraging other breast cancer survivors to start breast cancer dragon boat teams around the United Kingdom. They hold a paddlers' meeting bi-annually to which most teams send representatives.

A highlight of their past years was participation in the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Pageant in 2012. *Paddlers for Life* kindly lent the International Breast Cancer Paddlers' Commission one of their two dragon boats, Lucy at Low Wood and representatives from seven countries were able to join the 1000 other boats that paddled or motored under 23 bridges on the River Thames for this memorable event. www.paddlersforlife.co.uk

# New dragon boat inspires team

Wigan Water Dragons was formed five years ago when their chair, Patricia Rigg read an article about Paddlers for Life, Windermere. Six women made the journey to visit the Windermere team and were immediately hooked by the sport and the camaraderie it brought about. Wigan is a town in Greater Manchester about 25 kilometers west of Manchester on the River Douglas in England.

The *Dragons* are affiliated with *Paddlers for Life UK*, a registered charity based in Windermere. This team paddles once a week on Tuesdays and often has supporters in the boat with them.

Their exercise program, which is used by several British teams, was designed by **Dr Helen Crank** from Sheffield Hallam University. Dr Crank has done research into the benefits of paddling for breast cancer patients and has attended IBCPC events.

The *Wigan Water Dragons* have just purchased, thanks to the Big Lottery Fund from Wigan Council, a new dragon boat which seats 20 paddlers and is a treat for them as their previous boat was very heavy and cumbersome. www.wiganwaterdragons.org

# \*\* Australia hosts-World-Championship

The 10<sup>th</sup> International Dragon Boat Federation (IDBF) Club Crew World Championships (CCWC) took place in Adelaide, Australia from April 1 to 7, 2016. There were five breast cancer teams registered for the standard 20 person breast cancer division: *Abreast of Life* - New Zealand, *Dragons Abreast Sydney* 

and *Missabittatitti* – Brisbane both from Australia, *Paddles & Pearls* – Charleston, USA and *Rowbust*-London, Canada.

**Rowbust** had a special reason to make the trip to Australia. They wanted to defend their win at the 9th IDBF CCWC which had been held in Ravenna, Italy in 2014. And, they did indeed win again the 200 and 500 meter races.

**Linda Kuska,** Captain of the *Rowbust* team reported people asked her why they push themselves so hard and she responded: "we do work hard but we work as hard as the rest of the athletes participating at this level. The racing was amazing but it was also the friendships made on and off the water that will last a lifetime".

She extended a special thank you to the *Dragons Abreast Canberra* team who made their boats and equipment available to *Rowbust* for their eight day training camp in Canberra prior to the CCWC.



Australia's Dragons Abreast Canberra with Canada's Robust team Knowing they were going to face some tough competition, **Corina Bradley** and **Linda Carrad** from *Missabittatitti* reported on their win in the 2,000 meter race. They started training back in September 2015, sometimes five or six times a week. It was such a close race the team did not know if they had won until they were asked to line up in front of the gold dais to receive their medals. Lots of tears of joy and an honour guard of friends and supporters as they left the dais.

For *Dragons Abreast Mount Warning* Australia there was great excitement for their 200 and 500 meter wins in the small boat breast cancer division where they competed against breast cancer teams *Paddlers in the Pink* - Singapore, *Dragons Abreast Tasmania* and *South Australia Dragons Abreast Inc.*

### Encouraging the competitive members on your team

After the International Dragon Boat Federation World Nations Championship in Welland, Canada in 2015, **Liz O'Connell,** IBCPC USA representative from St. Petersburg, Florida undertook a study of breast cancer paddlers who participated in this event. Liz identified 27 breast cancer survivors

from Canada and the USA who raced competitively on their national teams. In addition, she took the opportunity to learn how being a survivor has impacted these individuals as competitive athletes. Liz's comprehensive article can be found on the IBCPC website www. ibcpc.com She concluded her article with a series of recommendations that address the competitive paddler. They include:

- 1. If your team gets more competitive, continue to reach out to survivors in the community and be easily accessible and open to new paddlers;
- 2. Recognize the needs of the highly competitive paddlers on your team encourage them to excel and help them

find more competitive teams, camps, or training opportunities if they need a greater challenge. Don't wait until their frustration results in a mutiny or they leave your team with hard feelings. Encourage them to stay connected with your team as they take on more challenges. They can be good role

models for the team. Remind them that you're still available for BC support should they need it. Encourage your team to follow and celebrate their success;

- 3. Encourage BCS teams to have a "Try-Out" seminar or mock try-out practice to discuss criteria for national team selection and give the team a sense of what it takes to try out. (Selection criteria can be found on the website for your national team.) It may inspire members to try out and will give the rest of the team an appreciation for what the national teams do; and
- 4. Know which paddlers on your team are interested in trying out for the national team. Give them encouragement and help them monitor their training progress, if needed.
