Membership. Under the leadership of Cecilia Picchi, our European Representative and member of the Florence Dragon Lady team and Adriana Bartoli, our Latin and South American Representative and member of Abreast In A Boat, Vancouver, Canada the number of our member teams has grown significantly. Once Cecilia was on the job she began discovering teams throughout Europe who were already paddling in their respective locations. She then doggedly made contact with them and encouraged the formation of new teams. We now have member teams from Spain, Austria, Germany, Belgium and France.

Adriana took a slightly different approach. She is from Argentina and with her enthusiasm safely tucked into her heart she began raising awareness about breast cancer paddling during her South American adventures. It was not long before she had created enthusiasm in Argentina and Brazil. This past year she led two trips to South America, one to Argentina in February and the second to Brazil in October. Now we have teams in both countries and the numbers are growing each day. What a difference these individuals have made to the world of breast cancer paddling.

We can now boast teams on six continents and in twenty countries.

IBCPC Trust Established. On another front the IBCPC Steering Committee has established the IBCPC Trust, a legal entity registered as a non-profit society in British Columbia Canada. This entity will give the Commission the platform to begin sponsorship activities across the globe. It also bodes well for the future of our organisation as it gives confidence and structure to the Commission. Qatar Team doubles its size

We are coming up on our two year anniversary this November and we have grown to more than double the size. The team is open to survivors of breast cancer, but also other cancers. We currently have survivors of thyroid, colon, cervical, uterine and breast cancer on the team. Our team has also grown because we are open to all supporters joining us too. Many work in the health field or are university students or have heard about us from newspaper or magazine articles. The team varies in age (19 to mid-6o's), employment (students, house wives, life coaches, airline workers, teachers, business owners etc.) and nationality (Canadian, Egyptian, Jordanian, Palestinian, Philippian, American, Australian, British, South African, Iraqi, Lebanese) ...we run the gamut.

I think our growth is partially because we run the group on a pay-as-you-go/as-you-can basis, with all proceeds going to help the team who owns the boat when they need repairs or to pay for new jackets and paddles. We are open to all who wish to come and try us out, provide opportunities for members to learn to steer or coach and we just want to spread dragon boating joy! We have started doing social activities together, like picnics in the dunes, and often go out for coffee or breakfast after our practices.

Because we are a mixed group of people and I want to ensure I never offend anyone, we stop in the middle of the bay for a minute during every practice to pause and reflect on what



brought us to the boat, to send love and light to any we know who might need it and to be grateful that we are alive and paddling in salt water while living in the middle of a desert. It is always an emotional moment as, for example, we have had a number of new members recently join us whose mothers are battling breast cancer. It is a place of support and love and we all feel it. Whenever anyone joins us for a paddle, they leave feeling energized but also a bit reflective, I think.

We participated in our first mock race last month and will be participating in another at the end of the month to round off Breast Cancer Awareness month. I have no idea how we did in any of the heats last month, which might seem unusual for the head coach to admit, but my aims are to ensure everyone enjoys themselves and grows from their experience with us and that we all get, or continue to be, strong. Winning a race is certainly a future aim, but for now, we are happy to be winning the race called 'life'.

And finally, the best news of all. We have found a sponsor who wishes to buy us a boat! We are currently negotiating with the Qatar Dragon Boat Federation, of which we are one of seven members, to decide on whether there is room for our purchase on the beach at Katara here in Qatar. We hope so as it would be great to have a pink boat alongside all the other ones. Pink boat, pink jackets and pink wigs whenever we race. Yep...the breast cancer team is making itself known in Qatar.

Irish Festival attracts International Teams

Held during the weekend of September 10th and 11th 2016, it attracted eight international teams from as far away as Canada, the USA, Germany and Austria. Twenty-five teams took part each day in the event. In addition, Irish club teams and novice teams also participated. It was a great success and a source of pride for the organizers, the Irish

Dragon Boat Association and the *Pluarbelle Paddlers* that teams would travel from so far away to paddle in Dublin.

We also welcomed the two newest BCS teams to Dublin regatta – *Graine Mhaol* from Castlebar Co Mayo and the *Nore Dragon Paddlers - KACC* from Kilkenny City.

Gràine Mhaol was established in July 2015 by Louise Killeen. This followed a visit by Louise to the Plurabelle Paddlers in Dublin to find out what was involved in getting the sport up and running. They started off with 45 women and are now looking to purchase a second boat to extend their membership to non cancer members. Dragon boating is a new and minority sport in Ireland so it's great that they're introducing as many people to the sport as possible. They train twice weekly on Lough Lannagh during the summer months.

The Nore Dragon Paddlers – KACC had their maiden voyage in May 2016. This came after an initial idea in 2015 by an MLD physiotherapist in Kilkenny to establish a club. They purchased two boats from a local businessman and with the help of Kilkenny Aqua Canoe Club and much fundraising they're now up and running. Four women from Kilkenny, Paula Fleming, Fiona Wallace, Anne Smart and Mary Treacy trained with the Suir Dragon Paddlers in Clonmel in early 2016 until they were able to paddle in Kilkenny. They currently have 27 members and train on Saturday mornings over the winter months.

Ireland now has eight breast cancer paddling teams and many are talking about going to Florence in 2018 either as a full team or as composite teams.

Russia seeks help in forming first team

In September I went to Moscow with the Master Italian National Team to take part in the International Canoe Federation (ICF) World Dragon Boat Championship. It was the first time I participated in a world championship as an athlete of a national team, preceded only by my participation in the ICF European Dragon Boat Championship, which was held in Italy. My previous international experiences have always been as a breast cancer paddler, in Canada in 2010 and in Florida in 2014 for the IBCPC International Festivals.

Our IBCPC Festivals are characterized by an abundance of the color pink, in all its shades. I saw women of all ages hugging each other and getting on the boats holding their paddles, with smiles on their faces. I was part of a pink wave, full of life and energy. I experienced very strong emotions, not only because of the races, but mostly because we were all there, unified by an event that has changed our lives and by the passion for the dragon boat, which has managed to transform our common pain into something unique.

At the Olympic Racing Course "Krylatskoe" in Moscow, I have seen athletes wearing uniforms in all the possible colors, but the reference for me was the blue of Italy, my homeland. Every race was full of concentration, adrenaline and explosive energy. I have rejoiced and suffered with my teammates, all united to give our best and be competitive in a world championship that saw Russia earn 32 medals, beating strong and well-motivated nations. The emotions were very strong, but different from the ones felt during our festivals, where hugs are never only shared with one's teammates.

I have shared a boat with professional and well-trained athletes and I feel honored for the opportunity to do that. I have won a silver medal and 3 bronze medals. It felt like a dream come true. A bad experience can turn into something amazing. I have a pink family spread around the world and I have won a world championship. Impossible? Definitely not!

Russia is a country that does not have a breast cancer team. Being present in Moscow has proved to be a unique opportunity



to meet the right people for our message to be heard, plant a seed that could eventually result in the formation of a team. It was pleasantly surprising to find our movement is known in Russia. I have talked to the president of a club from Moscow, who ended up being interested in our activity and willing to host and train breast cancer survivors. In order to do that, he needs our help in spreading the word in hospitals and among doctors, allowing the involvement of women and bringing them to his club to paddle. My hope is that soon Russia will give women the possibility to live the emotions that we live when we share a boat, when we hug because we are happy to have shared something that only those who practice this sport can truly understand and that we savor even more profoundly.

As excitement mounts for Florence in July 2018, a challenge for some teams will be deciding on a selection process for the 26-paddler limit for the team roster. *Survivors Abreast* of Peterborough, Ontario, Canada, decided to get an early start on tackling this.

At one of our earlier meetings, the team had an opportunity to discuss options for selection. Following the meeting, the boat captain sent out an email asking for ideas and their first choice option along with their rationale. Based on a review of that feedback and further discussion by the paddling/fitness committee and the board, the following proposal was put to a vote by the team and was carried. The motion was that the selection be made based on a calculation of points as follows:

- a. Assign 1 point for paddling at regattas.
- **b.** Continue awarding 1 point for every practice.
- **c.** Award 1 point for attendance at team meetings. We need team participation and engagement at the organizational level as well as at athletics. (New)
- **d.** If injured and unable to paddle and, as long as the injury will not be aggravated, award 1 point for coming to practice and participating in the warm up, walking or running, and then the cool down.

As background, a point system has been in place for several years and is familiar to, and accepted by, team members. It has been used frequently when there has been a need for paddlers to "sit out races" at festivals we attend.

I hope the organizers of the Florence event will recognize the true spirit of the Participatory event and celebrate it the way it should be celebrated by promoting inclusiveness.
